The summer is here, and we are all hopefully going to enjoy the warm weather with the sun. As I write it's raining and not too warm but I'm sure all of us will enjoy the light nights and hopefully the sun when it re-appears.

Anyway, to business, what has the Parish Council been doing on your behalf and what is going to happen over the coming few months?

New Councillor

We are pleased to report that Cllr Jordan Parker has been co-opted on to the Council. Jordan we are sure, will fit in well with and add to the great team we have working on our village's behalf. Look out for him, over the next few months and hopefully years, as he finds his feet and his part in moving Kilsby forward. With Jordan's arrival the Council at last has a full complement of councillors again.

Speed Watch 2023

Cllr Ian Weston has again secured the equipment for speed watch, and this will start week commencing 24th July and run for four weeks. If you have a few hours to help, Ian would be pleased to have you and I am confident you would enjoy the experience helping to reduce the speed through our village. Highways

Cllr Ian Weston and I have had several meetings with West Northants Council (WNC) regarding various matters of concern on roads and pathways throughout our village. One of the items we discussed was the speed restriction from 50mph to 40 prior to entering the village. You all be pleased to know that this should be in place in the very near future.

Potholes were also discussed, and several bad examples were shown to the inspector. He has promised to look into getting some of those reinstated and we are hopeful that these will be sorted very soon.

Butts Lane resurfacing should hopefully commence on Thursday 27th July. We will all, I'm sure, look forward to being able to walk through the area without getting ourselves or our dogs muddy.

The Council has applied to have double yellow lines on either side of Main Road between Essen Lane and Oldfield Lane. We felt it necessary to do this to stop motorists having to pull into the centre of

the road on the blind corner in order to pass parked vehicles. The application is to be dealt with in September and we will keep you informed as and when a decision has been made.

Defibrillator Phone box

The phone box has at last had some remedial works effected and a complete repaint. I am sure you will notice the difference when you go past.

We are trying to find a suitable accessible alternative to having the books in the phone box. If you have any ideas where this could be please do get in touch either with the writer or our clerk. We will keep you informed via social media or on our village web site when a suitable place has been found.

Community Green Space

The Council is considering the feasibility of a community green space/woodlands together with possible outside sports facilities. We have approached WNC about the funds available under the S106 scheme. The first thing we need to do is to identify and purchase some suitable land, either in the village or near the boundaries. Village Website

As I have mentioned in previous reports, the Council feels the village website should be upgraded and a working party headed by Cllr Ian Massey has been looking into the feasibility and costs involved. We will keep you informed about progress and hopefully the new site will be more pleasing to visit and use, with better access and more information from organisations throughout the village.

Climate Change

Cllr Ian Massey is the Council's lead on Climate Change. He has done an enormous amount of work on this subject and is organizing a CLIMATE CHANGE event, to be held on the 9th September 2023 in the Village Hall. Everyone is invited to attend. There will be presentations and a workshop. Refreshments will be available. More details are on pages 5 and page 22 of this edition.

Planning Application

The council was very surprised to learn of a second, supplementary, application from Cadman Shooting Club in Barby. This is for the provision of additional bunding which would cause considerable disruption whilst it is being built and will not have any significant benefit. The PC is objecting to the proposal and I'm sure some of you would wish to have input as to your thoughts. If so, can I suggest that a letter from you to WNC planning department would be appropriate. You will need to send this as soon as (Cont. On page 4)

As many Kilsby residents will be aware, a further recent planning application was submitted by Cadman Sporting regarding structural works at Barby Gun Club. The planning application concerning expanding the number of days the Club will operate has still to be decided. Meanwhile the new application proposes the construction of 8m high bunds on the site and other structural alterations. Any resident who wishes to comment but has not yet done so now has until the end of August to do so - this was confirmed to me by the case officer considering the application. I have attended both Kilsby and Barby & Onley PC meetings when the application was discussed and have already been emailed by numerous residents about the new application, so am well aware of the highway, landscape and amenity concerns that local people have about the proposal.

As regards the possible employment development site close to DIRFT, all three of your ward councillors will soon be having another meeting with Kilsby Action Group and the West Northants Executive Director of Planning. This will enable KAG and your elected representatives to be updated on any future plans the developer may have for this site that the Council has been made aware of.

The Council has recently published a number of public consultations which are open for residents to comment on, details are available via this link: <u>West</u> <u>Northamptonshire Council - Citizen Space</u> They include having your say on the future of Waste Services for which there are proposals to minimise waste and to develop services to prevent waste first and reuse and recycle. The draft Housing Allocation Scheme is another consultation that is open, covering who will be eligible to register for social housing and which applicants will be given priority. There are currently three schemes covering Daventry, South Northants and Northampton which now need harmonising into one scheme so as to be

consistent and fair for the whole West Northamptonshire area.

A draft local Health and Wellbeing Strategy will be out for public consultation in the coming weeks. This Strategy aims to reduce health inequalities in West Northants and to enable local people to be active and confident, enjoying good health and wellbeing. These are ambitious goals given the cost of living crisis and the different life experiences and life expectancies of residents - there are some stark differences in life expectancy between some communities living only a few miles apart. Also in the information are some sobering statistics on physical activity and obesity rates and hospital admission rates for self harm which are worse in our area when compared with the rest of England. There is much work to be done to support people to make good lifestyle choices and prevent poor health outcomes.

The Strategy also records that the number of people in West Northants consuming their "5 a day" was worse in 2019-20 than the English average. I don't imagine this will apply to customers using local community larders that are now running in West Northants, where fresh fruit and vegetables are available for free in addition to heavily discounted grocery items, fresh and store cupboard. The Daventry community larder, which is open to all villages as well as the town, celebrates its first anniversary this summer. Run by volunteers it is tackling both the increased financial hardship experienced in our communities and the problem of food waste - all the goods on offer would otherwise go to landfill. Open on Wednesday lunchtime and evening I volunteer and shop there as often as I can and it would be great to see some Kilsby residents shopping there too. Shopping orders can be delivered for those who cannot travel to Daventry. For more details go to: Hope Community Larders -Hope Centre (northamptonhopecentre.org.uk)

Climate Change is here in Kilsby so what can we do about it? As indicated in the last edition, a meeting will be held in the Village Hall on Saturday 9th September. Note the new start time of 10.00 am.

The world is seeing catastrophic changes to the environment leading to environmental crises - from extreme heat waves and wild fires to extensive flooding. The weather is becoming more extreme as our planet tries to adjust to increased levels of carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases in the atmosphere. Kilsby village is not immune - we have higher than average levels of CO_2 emissions and our carbon footprint is above the average in the UK and also in the Daventry area. Being surrounded by roads doesn't help nor does the fact that much of the village uses oil for heating.

The meeting will consist of guest speakers and displays to stimulate thinking about an action plan for what the village can do. These include Climate Action West Northants (CA-WN), Voltalia, M+S Renewables, Braunston Climate Action Network and West Northants Council. These will be followed by a workshop to draw up a plan for the village going forward. Refreshments will be provided.

What is going on at St Faith's?

As you may be aware, Rev Nigel left us at the end of May for pastures new. We are now in the process of recruiting a new vicar, but be warned, this will take some time. The system is designed to allow breathing space between incumbents, so that the parish can refresh and review its vision for the future and ensure that the new recruit fits the bill.

Over the next few months, the diocese will advertise the role and applications will be made. An interview day will be organised in October, and if all goes to plan, the new vicar could be installed in January 2024. However, this is assuming a perfect outcome. The process could take longer than planned, in which case the new vicar would not be in place until Easter 2024 or later.

Throughout this lengthy process the congregation of St Faith's will be supporting the village in every way they can. Regular Sunday services will be maintained and special services, such as weddings, baptisms and funerals can be arranged as needed. Our Social Committee is growing again after the pandemic and has already held its first coffee morning. Our annual trip in June started in the sunshine and all went well till a closed road and the diversion we were sent on took us on a route that surely was not suitable for a coach! The coach was touching the hedge on both sides of the road and we ended up reversing for a good bit (well done driver!) A friendly tractor driver told our driver how to escape. I'd never seen anyone's jaw actually drop but I have now! A lady outside her cottage was obviously stunned by the sight of a coach trying to inch past!

We were only a bit late reaching Kentchurch which is a lovely old house, not massive but full of history, having been owned by the same family since the Middle Ages. Our guide was full of stories and information, and in fact is the author of a book about the family. We had a great day out.

Past Alive are a group who don't just talk to you about a subject but come dressed in costume. So we had a cardinal, a monk and three nuns bearing a

whole variety of artefacts waiting outside the Village Hall when we arrived for our last meeting!

By 1460 there were eleven religious houses in Northampton, Delapre Abbey being one of them. These houses were small; often holding as few as a dozen inmates. Our visitors were full of fascinating information about the clothes they wore; their lives and the artefacts they used. Nuns would probably wear leather boots and stockings which tied above the knee, a shift and then a habit with a belt holding it all together. Often the belt would have items attached to it like a scrip (bag) to hold your knife, trencher and spoon. Of course there would also be a rosary. A scapula (apron) covered it all and a veil and wimple covered your head. All very heavy and very hot to wear!

Our meetings are at 19:30 on the second Thursday of each month in the village hall - visitors are welcome - it's just £5. At our August meeting we'll hear about the faith that sustained people during WWI.



The proposed Barby Road development has not come to a planning committee as we hoped it would have done by now. In this case two things have happened since we last updated KK readers . Firstly, we had a meeting with the Campaign for the Protection Of Rural England(CPRE) who have written a superb critique of the proposal and sent it to the planning Officer on behalf of Kilsby. Secondly, we had an expectation that the case would come before a planning committee but sadly that hasn't happened so far. Cllr Alan Chantler has written to the department asking in the strongest possible terms that there be no further delay, and the case is heard ASAP. It won't make the August planning committee, but we have our fingers crossed for September and will keep you updated as we want as many residents as possible to attend the planning committee meeting.

Bericote have now withdrawn their intention to bring a planning application for the land between Kilsby and DIRFT **outside of the Local Plan Process**, KAG is certain that the reaction of village residents, both in the survey that many residents took part in and the village hall consultation meeting, which had a massive turnout and left the developer in no doubt of the level of opposition they faced, was a key reason for that decision. **THANK YOU.**

However, they will continue to try to develop the land within the Local Plan Process, the next stage of which is the publication of a DRAFT PLAN in Autumn 23 which will go out for further consultation. KAG will let you know when that happens and help those of you who wish to take part in that phase. We will also be instructing a planning consultant to prepare a statement on behalf of KAG and the village. His fees will be paid for using the pledges of support we have had from many residents. The last stage, probably in 2024, will be a public examination of the plan by a Planning Inspector, KAG will attend, and we will be represented by a Barrister. Be in no doubt that the developer will go all out to succeed in getting this land deemed a permitted development site but KAG, with your support, will fight them all the way to keep the green buffer between the village and DIRFT.

We have been asked to give more details of Kilsby Action Group for newcomers to the village. We are a group of Kilsby residents who first came together in 2015 as a response to a specific threat from an aggressive developer. We believe that a core group with the wider support of village residents can impact on planning decisions that affect our community and we have had some success in fending off inappropriate planning applications. The current core group is ten people, and we have some others who support us as needed with specific projects. We have a formal constitution, and we are registered with the Information Commissioner to comply with data protection regulations. We have a business bank account with Cashplus, an online bank who are covered by the Government's FSCS scheme which protects deposits. We have a good relationship with our Parish Council, but we and the Council have different roles in the community. We also have good relationships with our District Councillors. irrespective of political allegiance. We also are very fortunate to be supported by our extremely busy MP, Chris Heaton-Harris.



GARDENERS' CORNER

Changeable weather

After a wet March, dry April and hot June we now seem to be in a showery July. It's anybody's guess what August will bring.

More geraniums for nothing

Geranium cuttings root really easily. You can take them any time in August. Take shoots 4 or 5 inches long (10 to 12cm) that are not carrying flowers. Trim just below a joint and insert several round the edge of pots of sandy compost. Put them in a shaded sheltered place indoors or out. Be mean with the watering or they will rot. You can tell when they have rooted as they will start growing. Then you can increase the watering.

Prune your spring raspberries...

Cut off all the old canes as soon as fruiting has finished. Treat the remaining new canes to a mulch of compost, a dose of fertiliser and a good watering to encourage them ready for next year.

..and rambling roses

Rambling roses can often get straggly with few flowers low down. This is due to lack of pruning. Treat them like the raspberries! Cut the old flowered shoots well back to a strong new side shoot. Then mulch, feed and water to encourage the new shoots to develop for next year.

Jobs to do in August

Sow perennials Lift ripe onions and garlic Sow spinach, beet, carrots and parsnips Get ready for the KGPA Show.

Jobs to do in September

Sow hardy annuals Start planting bulbs for next year.

Times past...

In 'Directions for the Gardiner', John Evelyn, 1686:-"To be done in August...: Now (and not until now, if you expect success) is the just Season for the budding of the Orange Tree: Inoculate therefore at the commencement of this Month. Now likewise take up your bulbous Iris's, or you may sow their seeds, as also those of Larks-heel, Candy-tufts, Columbines, Iron-colour'd Fox-gloves, Holly-hocks and such plants as endure Winter, and the approaching seasons."

NATURE NOTES - JULY 2023

Well I hope you have seen some interesting wildlife in your garden so far this summer. Our camera has recorded lots of hedgehogs and it's great that so many other people have seen them around the village too. We watched some interesting behaviour one evening and our friends were amazed by two things – the hogs have long, strong legs and they can run fast when needed! Maybe one of them was Barry!

I know three orphaned hoglets were rescued from Independent Street so let's hope they made it and will have hoglets of their own next year.

There have been quite a few Garden Tiger moths which can easily be mistaken for butterflies. On a few summer evenings driving back into the village, I've noticed lots of moths in the headlights. I know moths aren't that popular (although weirdly I love them!) but they are so important for the survival of many species. There seem to have been more Box Moths about which isn't great – I haven't seen one myself but, from photos, they could be thought of as pretty but are very damaging to box plants. Although I don't like to hurt any creature, it would be best to destroy these as they are an invasive species. They can also have 3 life cycles per year which would be a lot of box tree caterpillars/moths!

I read recently that a Red Kite called Aragon which was brought to the UK in 1994 as part of a reintroduction programme had just died – that seems like a long life for a bird! I am very excited that we have a pair of kites almost daily over the village and I am hoping that they are resident and may even be breeding – I'd love to know where, but I favour over towards Ashby or Barby; somewhere where there are big trees. I volunteered on two projects in the late 60s – one in Wales and the other in the Chilterns – so I have a special interest!

The last couple of days have brought lots of Red Admiral and Peacock butterflies to the buddleia flowers – you can record your sightings on the Butterfly Conservation's app – Big Butterfly Count and it's very easy to use which helps!

I have read that our local Wildlife Trust has been granted permission to release beavers to a lake near Wellingborough in winter 2024 and also that there have been regular osprey sightings about 10 miles away so let's hope they have found a place to breed in our county too. It's also fantastic to hear that a white tailed sea eagle has hatched the first chicks in the UK for 243 years - so many reasons to be positive for nature lovers!

Enjoy the last few weeks of swifts swooping over the village before they fly back to Africa – I saw fifteen the other evening!

As I mentioned last month, this new Online Consultation platform is now up and running and can be used to submit a medical or admin request to the surgery and get help quickly without always having to visit or call the practice. This service is additional to what we currently do, and for those who are unable to use it the usual ways of dealing with the surgery will remain unchanged and patients can continue to contact the surgery as at present.

Repeat Prescriptions
