

Malt Mill Green

Several residents have passed remarks about the wildflower meadow this year as the flowers only lasted a few weeks and it became a little bit of a mess. At the council meeting on 14th November, the council decided to reduce the size of the meadow, re -grass the area, and plant shrubs on some of it (Cllr Weston will be looking for volunteers to help plant these in the new year). We are also intending to trim the trees on the green, so look out for the improvements.

Recreation Ground

Over the past few weeks, several residents have enquired about who can use the recreation ground and for what purposes. The land was donated by a former parishioner for the sole purpose of providing a play area in the village for the use of children under the age of 16. Obviously there is no problem with parents accompanying small children. The holding of any other events there is at the discretion of the holding charity, of which all the Parish Councillors are trustees.

The play equipment has all been cleaned and any necessary remedial work carried out. We hope the above clarifies the situation and that children will continue to enjoy using the facilities provided.

Budget 2024-25

The council has agreed the budget for next year and further information will be given in the next issue of the KK. If however any organisation is in need of funding for equipment or projects please do not hesitate to contact our clerk Emma or Councillor Ian Massey. All ideas will be considered by the council at our January meeting.

There have again been several complaints about inconsiderate parking around the village especially at school drop-off and collection times. Young adults leaving care in West Northamptonshire will receive automatic discounts on their Council Tax bills under new plans agreed by Cabinet. Starting from April 2024, a discretionary Council Tax discount will be automatically applied to the accounts of eligible Care Leavers aged 18-21, after considering other applicable discounts and exemptions.

Proposals for the future of waste and recycling services in West Northamptonshire have taken a step forward. Following a public consultation held over the summer, which received more than 3,000 responses, the strategy, which has been agreed by Cabinet, has been tailored to improve further the alignment with our communities' priorities and values. This will mean that the three-weekly black bin collection in the Daventry Area will probably change to fortnightly.

People with real housing needs including members of the Armed Forces, veterans and their families, care leavers, and victims of domestic abuse will benefit from a new housing allocations scheme. The scheme, which will be adopted from April 2024, has been developed following a 10-week public consultation and will provide an aligned and harmonised approach to ensuring that the area's valuable housing resources go to those most in need.

The government has announced that funding released by the abandonment of the northern extension to HS2 will be distributed to local authorities for road maintenance. This means that West Northamptonshire will receive a further 80 million pounds over the next 11 years to be spent on road resurfacing rather than just pothole filling.

Progress on developing a new Local Plan has been slower than anticipated, largely due to the number of responses received from the first round of consultation. The next round of consultation, originally expected in the summer, has been delayed. Following the assessment of housing and economic development required until 2041, it is now calculated that in that period we shall require an extra 3,000 houses and a further 9.5 Hectares of employment land. This is in addition to the numbers included in the current Plans. No decisions have yet been made as to where the extra development should be located. It is probable that the next consultation exercise will take place in the new year. Currently it is not anticipated that a new settlement will be required.

West Northants Council has responded to the cost of living crisis by setting up an online support hub and phoneline to help residents. Details are:

Cost of living support | West Northamptonshire Council (westnorthants.gov.uk) Tel 0300 126 7000. The webpage is designed to be user friendly and contains lots of information on accessing grants, money and debt advice, government funding, links to local community organisations and warm community spaces.

At present the Council has a total of 93 councillors. The Local Boundary Commission for England has decided that this number should be reduced to 77 and the first of two consultations on a boundary review recently closed. There will be further consultation in February-April next year on the proposed new pattern of wards. The Council has submitted a new draft pattern with some significant changes for villages in the current Braunston and Crick ward. Kilsby would remain part of a ward with just the villages of Crick, Barby and Onley. The proposal is to make it a single member ward only.

The reason for grouping these villages is that they share facilities and the impact of DIRFT is a common

issue for them all. This seems to ignore the fact that Lilbourne and Yelvertoft are also very close to DIRFT and also share services. Residents will be able to have their say about these proposals, and about being represented by a single councillor, at the second consultation next year.

Recently I met a group of young people representing the Northampton Youth Forum at an event for UK Parliament Week. I had my first experience of a political "speed date" where groups visited councillors at a table to ask questions and then circulated to another table. Many of the excellent questions asked were about environmental issues and how schools could be made greener. Secondary schools in West Northants could look at the example of the all year group eco-committee of Guilsborough School, which earlier this year was awarded an Eco-Schools Green Flag. Youth Forums are also planned for the Daventry and Towcester areas. When I have more information I will let Kilsby Youth Club know.

CAMPAIGN UPDATES Barby Road

West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) have confirmed that they have received a revised planning application for 19 homes. This will be subject to consultation, and that process should start within a couple of weeks of the delivery of this magazine.

We will then need everybody's help in objecting against the latest proposal.

As this is two years since the original consultation was delivered by Richborough we are somewhat bemused that they are bringing a revised scheme now. They key arguments are unchanged and KAG will be instructing a planning consultant with the money the community have kindly provided.

<u>DIRFT to Kilsby Commercial Development</u>. <u>Spatial Options site 3B</u>

We have reported that this site is one of the sites being considered in the upcoming local plan. We regard it as critical that this continues to be robustly opposed because building on that green space down the A5 will remove all the buffer between the village and the industrial area at DIRFT.

The target dates for the Draft Local Plan have been continually moved and currently the date is March 2024. We have had a productive meeting with senior officers at WNC on the 27th of November and will continue dialogue with them and will defend Kilsby's position.

We had a fascinating tour of the Lord Leycester Hospital in Warwick, guided by John, one of the brethren who live there. This medieval building has been home to retired soldiers for most of its life and whilst each brother has their own apartment they have the Brothers' Kitchen, the Guild Hall and the Chapel where they can meet, eat and enjoy services together. 

NATURE NOTES - JULY 2023

Hedgehog activity in our garden has been quiet recently; maybe as we've cut down on the feeding to discourage foxes. I've heard from other people around the village that hogs are still visiting so hopefully they're fattening themselves up nicely for their months of hibernation. We have seen some little bits of evidence, so I am confident that as so many villagers give them space to shelter and access through their gardens, they should be doing fine.

We're not getting huge numbers of birds in the garden, so I assume they are still finding plenty to eat in the hedgerows. However, they will be back so make sure your garden feeders are ready stocked. An idea we've tried to use up an excess of peanuts is to chop them up in a liquidiser – it is a good thing to do this as larger pieces can be dangerous for nestlings in the Spring.

Look out for winter thrushes – Fieldfares, Redwings and Mistle Thrushes which will be eating through the berries in the fields and hedgerows. If you've got fruit in the garden and the weather turns frosty, you might well see them visiting the garden for a fruity snack.

Have you ever heard of a Waxwing (Bohemian Waxwing to be totally accurate)? They are a stunning bird species which breed in Scandinavia and often migrate to other parts of Europe in large flocks in the winter in search of berries, usually hawthorn and rowan, often in gardens and suburban streets. This year they have arrived in large numbers mainly in Scotland and NE England and they are a treat to see. About 12 years ago, I had a couple briefly visit my garden in Kilsby which was amazing. This year we have been lucky enough to see about 20 in south-west Scotland. I will keep my fingers crossed that they'll venture to the Midlands in the next few weeks. Apparently, their livers are adapted to cope with eating frostbitten and semi-fermented berries which presumably allows them to continue flying when under the influence!

Along with Waxwings, many bird species migrate vast distances every year to seek food which helps them be fit enough to breed when they return home and also simply to survive. The techniques they use are also amazing. They use physical landmarks such as coasts and rivers; stars and the sun; the earth's magnetic field or just following other birds (hoping they are going in the right direction). It is a dangerous and exhausting business so it's a real wonder that so many birds reach their destinations in one piece, particularly the really tiny species.

GARDENERS' CORNER

Another long summer...

Our dahlias aren't frosted yet, but the flowers have lost all their colour. Ten years ago I was writing of the first frosts at the beginning of November! It's still very mild (and wet) so is November the new October? Of course that is no guarantee we won't be frozen in a couple of weeks time.

Don't tidy up

It's too wet to get on the ground, so take advantage of the latest fashion which is to leave foliage standing to give winter homes for insects. Just clear things that have fallen over your paths and leave the tidying until the spring.

Put the compost heap to bed

If you want some good compost in the spring then turn your compost heap now, adding water if necessary so that it is not too dry. But mind the toad! Our heap always has a toad in it which I move on to the next heap with appropriate apologies for the disturbance. Then cover it (the heap, not the toad) and leave it to rot down over the winter. It should be ready for use by April.

Jobs to do in December

Plant that garlic you should have planted in November!

Clean the paths of moss and mould.

Sit in the warm finishing your planting plan for next year.

Order any remaining seeds and plants

Jobs to do in January

Clean, wash and fumigate your greenhouse.

Start winter pruning of fruit trees.

Fork over round your bulbs and top dress with bonemeal.

Later in the month, sow tomatoes in warmth for early crops

Times past ...

From "Directions for the Gardiner", John Evelyn, 1664:-

"Vines should be pruned all the winter, before any sap rises, lest they bleed to death.

Clense all fruit trees from what too much hinders the sunn & aire, especialy, within the bodies of standards and dwarf trees, which keepe hollow like a bell.

In summer pruning vines & wall fruite, expose it not naked to the sunn, but discreetely thin the leaves where there is occasion; for too much baring, shrivells and exhausts the fruite."
