This edition brings worrying news about the potential closure of the Chapel in the village after more than 400 years of non-conformist worship in Kilsby, 240 of them in the chapel building in the middle of the village. At the same time there are serious concerns about the Village Hall with no-one so far coming forward to take on the roles of Secretary and Booking Secretary. And so far no-one has shown any interest in taking over editorship of Kronicle when the three of us step down at the end of March so yet another village 'institution' may well fold.

In the past villagers have supported all these things and people have always come forward to fill the shoes of those 'retiring' from the roles which organise and run them. This was part of the pattern of village life which we all cherished and took responsibility for in the past. It will be very sad if people in Kilsby no longer value some of the things which have made the village such a good place to live sufficiently to help as their predecessors have done. We hope that this is not the case and that now that 'the chips are down' people will ensure that these village institutions can continue and thrive.

One group of volunteers in the village which is certainly doing sterling work on behalf of us all is the Kilsby Action Group and there is a report from them on page 10 which makes interesting reading. The KAG have done a great deal to try to protect the village from unsuitable and intrusive development and are going to need the help of all of us in the coming months to add our voices in support during the consultation and planning processes.

Another successful venture which relies heavily on volunteers is the Village Shop and it is good to know that its future is now much more secure. Kilsby would be a much poorer place without it. This edition carries an advertisement for a part-time manager to work with Sarah and we hope that a good candidate can be appointed quickly.

Finally, we are delighted to see that the WI will once again be running its Mother's Day Flower Stall - another of those activities which are so important in the life of Kilsby but which would not happen without willing volunteers.

Speed Change A 361

As you will have noticed, changed speed limits have been brought in on the A361 going out of the village. As many of you have commented, these are not in an ideal place and are dangerous. The Parish Council would like to point out that the changes are not we expected and agree with the comments made on Kilsby Village Face Book page. Councillor Weston and I will be having a meeting with Highways as soon as possible and will be requesting a temporary change in the new limits until Highways are able to install the changes originally agreed.

West Northants Council has recently opened a consultation on a draft Local Cycling and Infrastructure Plan (an 'LCWIP') for Daventry. There are similar consultations out for the towns of Brackley and Towcester and they are all open until 25th February. These plans set out 10 year proposals to provide routes to make getting around without the need for a car journey easier, benefiting health, air quality and helping to reduce carbon emissions.

One of the maps in the LCWIP shows that it would take 30 minutes to cycle from Kilsby to Daventry – if there was a safe route to take. The consultation focuses on routes connecting four villages, including Braunston, which are twenty minutes from the town. So while Kilsby is too far from Daventry and the consultation survey questions concentrate on the proposed routes in the town there is an opportunity to suggest other routes as a priority and to make general comments.

So if you have an interest in extending safe cycling routes to connect more of our villages to our towns please take part in the survey: <u>Have your say on</u> <u>Daventry Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan</u> -<u>West Northamptonshire Council - Citizen Space</u> Although many of our rural roads are far too treacherous to cycle, with high vehicle speeds and narrow lanes with no footway, there is a substantial network of others which are little used by cars and have potential to attract the visiting leisure cyclist. These tranquil lanes could boost the local tourist economy, if properly invested in. Cabinet has recently approved a Tourism Strategy which aims to reverse the recent decline in visitor numbers and change the status of our visitor attractions as one of 'Northamptonshire's unsung economic heroes'.

Had our our county's visitor economy grown over the past decade at the same pace as that of our neighbours in Cambridgeshire it would have resulted in £36m more spending by overnight visitors and some 660 jobs either safeguarded or created. Northants may not have King's Chapel or Bletchley Park, or a famous medieval king discovered under one of its car parks but it has a wealth of attractions to compete with our neighbouring counties. These attractions in our unsung county deserve far greater recognition and our local economy would reap the benefits.

Thank you to everyone in Kilsby who supported KAG during 2023. Residents really showed how the desire to keep our community as an independent village is widespread. Without doubt the response that the developers got in the village hall when they presented their plan to build more warehouses closer to the village had a major impact on the end users decision to seek another site. This reinforced KAG's central belief that a core group of people with the support of the wider community can impact decisions about what happens in their village. Happy New Year to everyone and the campaign continues in 2024 - and probably beyond.

Barby Rd - proposed building of houses in green fields

In November we were told that a revised application was coming to build 19 houses on this land outside the village envelope. As KK goes to press, we haven't been given the formal documents in order that we can object but we are preparing our objection now and have instructed our planning consultant (who is paid for by donations from Kilsby residents).

When the details are confirmed, we will contact you and ask for your support by objecting to this application. 
The original application in 2021 was for 44 houses, KAG is of the opinion that irrespective of the number of houses proposed by the plan, building into green fields outside the village envelope is not allowed by West Northants Council's own policies and it should be refused. We also believe that if building into green space is allowed on this site, then any land around Kilsby will be a target and we will be joined up to Rugby or Daventry in due course.

West Northants Council Draft Local Plan - Site 3b proposed warehousing between DIRFT & Kilsby

The draft local plan, which will decide which sites will be allocated for development during the plan period up to 2041, is due to be published in March 2024. KAG has been in touch with all 3 of our District Councilors and they sent a joint statement to the Planning Director setting out why development should not be allowed in Kilsby. We also have worked with our MP and CPRE who have both made it clear to WNC why our site should not be included in the local plan. We have supplied them with evidence on several topics, particularly the traffic impact on Kilsby which would be caused by further warehouse development. We met the Planning Director in November, and he confirmed all our evidence was being considered in the decisionmaking process. Once the Draft Local Plan is published there will be a period of consultation and KAG will let you know details so you can comment. The process will then go to a public examination in early 2025 and KAG is preparing to represent the village at that enquiry.

We are concerned that reports of progress of the Draft Plan being favourable to Kilsby are premature as the process has some way to go yet.

The latest news is that KAG met our District Councilors last week and we have agreed a twin track approach to lobby for Kilsby. The Councilors are going to call a meeting with the appropriate officers and politicians at WNC who have responsibility for the Draft Plan to renew their call for this site not to be in the final version as there is evidence that it is simply not necessary and that building on the green buffer between the village and the site is simply not sustainable, or worthwhile for the number of jobs created. KAG is going to ask for a meeting in Westminster with our MP Chris Heaton-Harris and national planning officials. There are reports that our area may be asked to take more development than we need because of the national importance of the 'Golden Triangle of logistics'.



NEW EDITORIAL TEAM NEEDED FOR KRONICKLE


As set out in the last edition, the three of us who currently edit and produce Kronickle are stepping down at the end of March - which means that unless people come forward to take on our roles, the next edition of the magazine (April-May) could be the last.

We feel that this would be a very sad loss to the village. Kronickle first began in the 1980s but stopped because of lack of contributions. It was relaunched in 1998 and the current edition is the 154th since then and the 114th that I have put together since I took over as editor in 2004. Even though the world has changed significantly since then and social media is now widely used to publicise information and events, we believe there is still enormous benefit in having a paper magazine which is delivered to every home in the village six times a year and which pulls together in one place all the information which is otherwise only available to residents through a variety of social media sources, which are not accessible to everyone. For those who prefer to get their information on screen Kronickle is also posted on the village website.

The Parish Council have always strongly supported Kronickle, recognising the benefits to our community of an effective and reliable communication medium. They pay the costs of printing, although these are now significantly offset by the advertising revenue the magazine attracts. Despite this funding from the Council the magazine is totally independent and has full editorial control.

The editorial roles are very interesting and get us involved with people and groups all over Kilsby, and beyond. The main role involves getting in material and advertising from individuals and organisations and putting this into the magazine format, together with suitable photographs. This takes about five days every other month and is very straightforward. It does not require sophisticated technical skills The draft magazine is then carefully checked by the other two editors, who also input to policy decisions, and changes made as necessary before it is sent, electronically, to printers in Rugby. Once the magazine has been printed John and Brenda Beeston distribute it to the volunteer delivery team and they will be continuing to do this. The final task for the editors is to send out invoices to advertisers and advise the Parish Council of the income raised and printing costs for each issue. The roles are not unduly onerous and a new team would be free to reorganise responsibilities and the way the magazine is put together to suit them.

We very much hope that someone will come forward to continue the magazine. It is an important community asset and part of Kilsby's identity as a village. Please, if you think you might be interested, get in touch with me to find out more, on 822650 or at lomdoucd@gmail.com



NATURE NOTES - JANUARY

Not everyone likes January but for me, it's a month full of hope – the days are slowly getting longer, the birds are starting to claim their territories and seek a partner, there's always a possibility of a starling murmuration and wow, Spring isn't that far off! There's only a very small group of starlings flying around at dusk so far, but I'm told there's a larger group in Crick and continuing to make a mess on a few cars!

Our pond is currently frozen and I'm just hoping that there's enough oxygen at the bottom to sustain a few lives in there – I have tried gently breaking the ice but it seems to freeze up again pretty quickly at -5. If your pond has lots of plant life in or around it, don't forget to clear it by mid to late February - certainly before the frog gathering season. If you leave it until later, you are far more likely to disturb any spawn. I do always shake the clumps for the compost over the pond and then pick off any snails, dragonfly larvae or other biddies to save as much life as possible.

The frog mating season starts as early as January in the South-West of the UK and by March, ponds all over the country should have spawn – we always hope that some will eventually develop into adults but sadly ours always gets eaten by newts who seem to time their breeding to coincide with the frogs' very tasty and nutritious offerings!

As I mentioned in the last edition, Waxwings which are winter visitors to the UK have swept across the country in their thousands this winter and probably in the highest numbers for about thirteen years. Waxwings are the only bird I would travel far to see as they are completely stunning and can rival any exotic species in the world in my opinion - look on the internet and see if you agree! Unlike many species, they favour housing developments or urban sites where developers have kindly planted native trees and bushes such as Rowan, Cotoneaster and Blackthorn. We've been to several sites only a few miles away but did see them in a new housing area in Corby - three weeks later they are still munching their way through the berries and there plenty more to go.

Another thing I watched recently was the spectacular swooping of a Sparrowhawk, claws extended ready to pin a small unsuspecting bird onto the ground. Five minutes or so later, it was on my neighbour's fence swiftly removing the poor bird's feathers. It's grim I know, but of course a reality in the natural world and after all, that little bird had probably destroyed many insects and caterpillars to keep itself going for the previous six months.

Spring isn't that far off when we can expect more moths, butterflies, hedgehogs from hibernation and migrant birds as the world wakes up again – can't wait!

GARDENERS' CORNER

Wet & Dry

After a very wet mild autumn the first two weeks of January have flipped to cold and dry. The early bulbs have started showing, but the ground is still soaking.

Do some serious pruning

A cold clear February day, with the ground hard, is ideal for serious pruning. Look to your trees and shrubs and cure overcrowding by taking out complete branches right back to the main trunk or stem. Get them into a pleasing shape too – what looks right is right

Uncover your bulbs

Now your bulbs in the borders are showing, tidy up and weed round them and give them a dose of bonemeal. Leave the rest of the borders untidy until the end of February to keep some shelter for wildlife.

Chack your autumn cuttings

Pots of autumn cuttings of half-hardy plants will be well –rooted and starting to grow. Pot them on into individual pots of new compost. Remember not to overwater and keep the leaves dry! The best way to water pots is to dunk them for a few minutes in a tray or bowl of water.

Jobs to do in February

- Clean your pots and greenhouse ready for the season;
- Divide up any perennials that are too large;
- Start dahlias in the greenhouse.

Jobs to do in March

- Stake and tie any plant liable to be damaged by March winds;
- Sow tomatoes in trays or pots on a windowsill;
- Prune your roses when the hardest frost risk is past;
- Sow hardy annuals in seed trays or pots.

Times past...

In "Directions for the Gardiner", John Evelyn, 1686:-

'PRUNE fruit-trees and Vines as yet; For now is your Season to bind, plash, nail and dress, without danger of Frost. This to be understood of the most tender and delicate wall-fruit, not finished before; do this before the buds and bearers grow turgid; and yet in the nectarine and like delicate mural-fruit*, the later the pruning the better, whatever has been, and still is the contrary custom.'

Nb 'plashing' is layering as in layering a hedge by part cutting and laying branches horizontally..

COMMUNITY BENEFIT FUND FOR CRICK AND KILSBY

Fund Overview

Daintree Wind Farm Ltd has committed £12,000 each year into a community Fund, which is split equally between the Parishes of Crick and Kilsby in Northamptonshire.

The Fund allows groups to apply for grants between £250 and £6,000. There is one application round to apply to each year.

The application closing date for 2024 is: 10 April 2024, decisions end June 2024.

Project Location

Projects for which grants are requested must be located in the Parishes of Crick or Kilsby.

Project Purpose

Priority will be given to:

- Energy efficiency or renewable energy projects, such as insulation, efficient boilers or small scale renewable energy installations
- Training or education projects, especially vocational training for unemployed young people under the age of 25 years old
- Projects for school age children, or older people
- Any other community projects for the benefit of residents of the local area

For full details of what can be funded (there are limited exceptions), please see the Funding Criteria, available on GrantScape's website.

Eligible Organisations

Eligible Organisations, who can apply for funding include:

- Voluntary, community groups
- Parish Councils
- Schools and educational establishments
- Social enterprises (including credit unions, co-operatives, social firms, community owned enterprises, community interest companies and development trusts) provided they operate on a not-for-profit basis and have minimum of three unrelated Directors.

Applicants need to have a written constitution, a set of rules, or a governing document and a bank or building society account held in the name of the organisation in place before applying for a grant. If you don't have these please consider asking if the Parish Council can apply on your behalf.

Applicants can apply for further grants each year, however, they may not receive priority over organisations that have previously been turned away or those who are applying for the first time.

Recommendations as to which projects should receive funding are made by two locals Panels, one representing Crick and the other Kilsby.


