Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP)

A drop in event will be held on Saturday 16th October from 10.00 -12.00 noon in Kilsby Village Hall, to allow anyone who wishes to view the documents or ask any questions on the revised NDP to do so. The Planning Consultant who has helped the Parish Council to carry out the review will be attending and able to answer any questions you may have.

We have undertaken this review to ensure that our NDP is still relevant and in line with higher planning

policy. Additionally, the Plan now includes Design Codes to ensure that the design of any new buildings enhances the character of the parish.

There will be a consultation period, from 1st October until the 15th November, to give everyone living in the Parish the chance to give their views on the draft Plan. It is important that as many of us as possible respond to this opportunity, especially since the Parish is shortly to receive a planning application for a large development off Barby Road.

The new Council continues to develop according to plan. The various teams are working well together and there has been no reduction in services despite the pandemic. We are also on plan to finish the half year with a balanced budget which bodes well for an end of year balanced outcome.

Planning application and Enforcement caseloads continue to be very high, and we are taking steps to recruit to vacant posts to reduce the backlog of work. We continue to look at new ways to improve our processes, efficiency and responsiveness. Over the coming months we will see improvements and service developments that acknowledge some of the challenges we have faced in providing the service we would like to offer.

A harmonised Enforcement Policy for the three Local Plan Areas has been drafted and will be coming to Cabinet in October. This will provide a clear framework for response times, investigation and actions for possible planning breaches. There will be a central portal on the WNC website for the public and members to report suspected breaches of planning law. The administration of Section 106 and Community Infrastructure Levy money continues to be a challenge, and it is intended that this can be addressed by the ongoing review of the Council's Constitution and in developing a more focused and responsive process.

There has been some confusion concerning the rules for referring a planning application for 'Call In' to the committee. It is planned to issue some helpful notes to all parishes in the near future.

My attention has been drawn recently to a couple of proposals which may be under consideration by developers. In each case there is much doubt that the proposals will be in accordance with current policy in which case they would not be supported by the Council. A recent application in Yelvertoft was refused for the same reason.

Remember that we are here to serve you so get in touch if you have any queries or worries.

Earlier this month West Northants Council (WNC) welcomed around 200 refugees from Afghanistan, who are now being accommodated in two hotels. The resettlement effort is supported by North Northants Council and emergency and health services, faith groups and the voluntary sector. Offers of help have poured in from local groups and individuals, and there is a link on the village website as to how to get involved or make a donation. It's difficult to imagine what traumas and experiences these adults and children have been through before arriving in the UK and a big effort is being made to support them while they are staying in our area. If you want to find out more there is a short video made by WNC on YouTube.

The Parish Council will soon have two important planning applications to comment on – the Richborough proposal for a 42 dwelling development off Barby Road and the expansion of Barby Sporting Club. The concerns of a large group of residents at this month's Parish Council meeting about Richborough's plans was very evident. When the applications are out for consultation I shall be working hard to represent your community's views.

There will also be an important strategic planning consultation opening next month. West Northants is preparing a new strategic plan and what's known as a "Spatial Options" consultation is opening on 4th October. Two potential sites will be of particular interest and concern to Kilsby and neighbouring villages, called Spatial Option 3, Employment Options at M1 Junction 18. Option 3b is a 63 hectare area of land south of DIRFT which could come forward for employment use and would be accessed by the A5 and A428. However the development could impact on part of the setting of Kilsby and look as if it was physically joined with part of the village.

Other options, if chosen, could affect Braunston and Long Buckby. One of the main reasons for a possible settlement for up to 5000 at Long Buckby is its rail connections to London, Rugby, Coventry and Birmingham. Feedback is going to be key in the eventual choices of sites, which are all described as potential, not preferred sites, so it will really important for parish councils, community groups and individuals to comment on the consultation when it opens.

The Great Big Green Week, which took place 18th-26th September this year was another way of showing decision makers that people care about climate change. The local environmental group, Climate Action West Northants (CA-WN) organised

several contributions to what was the largest event ever in the UK celebrating how communities are tackling climate change and protecting green spaces, so that everyone can be encouraged to take part.

In June West Northants Council pledged to hold a 'Climate Action Now' summit for businesses and residents. As yet there are no details, but in a recent report to Cabinet this plan seems to have been amended to a series of events for September and October, from which a Climate Strategy will be devised in time for the COP26 in November.

At last month's parish council meeting at Crick I learned that there had been some cross-pollination of initiatives from Kilsby and Barby, when it was agreed that Crick would be planting two wildflower areas in the village. Which reminds me of the fabulous bees swarming about the wall in Middle Street during Kilsby Yarn Bombing. I hope that they will be buzzing in the ears of the judges should your village decide to enter the 2022 Northamptonshire Village Awards! (More details about entering from Northamptonshire ACRE.)



Kilsby Fete raises over £4,400 for local charities

Kilsby's 'Kommunity' turned out in force on Sunday 29 August, Bank Holiday weekend, for the first Kilsby Village Summer Fete for many years, and what a huge success it was! (See pics on pages 14/15.)

The park was packed from the start, as hundreds of village families joined the fun. With stalls, games, entertainment, a beer tent, the WI tea rooms, and lots more, there was plenty to keep fete-goers of all ages occupied.

Highlights included the very popular and successful dog show, which attracted over 40 entries.

Thanks to financial support from Kilsby Parish Council, the fete organising committee were also able to lay on some great entertainment. A lorry stage hosted some incredibly talented young acts from Rugby Area Talent Trust – including Rugby's Got Talent winner Paul Sammon, and finalists Jess Lea and Oliwia Dragon. We also heard a dozen ukes performing together from Danetre Ukelele Orchestra, and from Last Lesson, a very talented covers band hailing from Rugby who headlined the day.

David Head, Event Co-ordinator, said "The organising committee – there were 8 of us involved – were absolutely delighted with the turnout and the way things ran. It was a great thing to see the community emerging after the last 18 months of lockdown, heartache and worry. To see so many happy smiling people made all the work worthwhile, and the fact that we were so successful has meant a great boost to local charities as well, we ended up with £3,000 to donate plus we know that charity stalls on the day made over £1,400 on top of that. Incredible."

Profits from the day included over £800 from the bar, with The Red Lion team donating all of their profits to the fete charities.

The committee later surprised the community with news of the total amount raised and presented three local charities with cheques at The Red Lion. Rugby Area Talent Trust received £600, and our own village charities Kilsby Village Hall and Kilsby Pre-School received £1,200 each. Representatives from both charities said they were "gobsmacked" at the amount raised and that it would "make a huge difference".



Can you, or someone you know, help the children of Kilsby School?

Are you interested in becoming a Governor?

We need to recruit **three new Governors**. These cannot be parents as we already have our quota of parent governors. We are looking for two members of the community who would become co-opted governors and one member of the community to become a foundation governor.

Co-opted Governors come from all walks of life, but we'd be particularly keen to hear from anyone with a business, health & safety, or financial background.

The role of a school governor is to contribute to the work of the governing board in ensuring high standards of achievement for all children and young people in the school by:

- setting the school's vision, ethos and strategic direction;
- holding the headteacher to account for the educational performance of the school and its pupils;
- overseeing the financial performance of the school and making sure its money is well spent.

All Church of England Schools must have Foundation Governors, who are appointed by the Diocesan Board of Education following nomination by the Parochial Church Council for the parish in which the school is situated. We have two Foundation Governors on our board so you would not be alone in the role. Foundation Governors ensure the guiding principles of the founding church are embedded within all aspects of school life; ensure the terms of the trust deed governing the school are adhered to; understand policies on RE, collective worship, spiritual development; understand the importance of the school's foundation and ethos; and understand the purpose of the Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools (SIAMS) inspection and what it is looking at and for.

The role of school governor can be very rewarding. Activities include: undertaking training in the role; attending meetings of the governing body of the school, (usually outside of school hours); reading reports and papers and keeping up to date on the progress that the school is making; and visiting the school from time to time during the school day.

NATURE NOTES

Well Autumn is well and truly here - the Swifts left in early to mid-August and the House Martins & Swallows are busy feeding themselves up before their long flight to Africa (not that I've seen many this summer over Kilsby sadly). The lawn is full of Daddy Long Legs and woe betide any that venture into the house. Fortunately, the ants have stopped flying!

Hedgehogs have continued to visit nightly, and we still have at least 5 individuals using our food plate. On some nights, we've had 2 feeding side by side with no confrontation so we assume they must be related to each other. On 10th August, we rescued a cute hoglet from a neighbour as it was too near the road and we are hopeful that this and another little one we spied in the garden, have increased in size, and are well set for the coming cold months and hibernation. It is great that other people in the village are also keen to help these cute and endangered creatures including 5-year-old Jemima whose poster (on page 16) pleads with drivers to go slow for hogs!

Squirrels in our part of the village seem to have had a very productive year as we've seen loads of them and even a feeding mother as late as 13th September. Sadly, our neighbour's walnut tree is being stripped and both her and our lawns are full of holes, while plant pots have been excavated to bury them. I still find them cheeky and amusing as long as the damage is only minor! Seeing one run along the top of our fence with 2 nuts stuffed in its face is enough to make anyone smile.

Butterflies were plentiful in the mid-August sunshine including the occasional Painted Lady but mostly Small Tortoiseshell, Peacocks and Red Admiral. My moth trap has had some huge quantities recently when the nights have been warm, cloudy and dry and I've had a few new ones this year like Bird's Wing and Old Lady (yes that really is the correct name!!). Maybe they have been attracted by plants we didn't have last year. I find moths intriguing but lots of people only think of carpet or clothes moths which in fact are only 2 out of over 2000 species. They feed on the keratin in the natural fibres of wool (or silk) and find man-made fibres less tasty, but they can use those carpets for hiding their eggs. A natural way to remove the larvae is to use baking soda followed by vinegar and water spray (or of course there's a whole arsenal of products you can buy).

Bats are still flying about at dusk, and I'm tempted to get a bat detector next year, the pond has loads of newlets and dragonfly larvae and we even watched a badger cross the road one evening out near Barby. Sparrows and blue tits have been bringing their large families to the feeders and starlings have continued to gather at dusk on the church spire but apart from that, the feeders have been quieter. We look forward to some interesting winter visitors before long.

GARDENERS' CORNER

A dry summer...

Well, we had normal rain in July but only half normal in June and August. Our apples didn't like it but the courgettes flourished. How did your garden cope?

Divide your herbaceous perennials

October is a good time to divide your herbaceous perennials. Cut the plant back first. Then dig it up, divide off strong looking pieces with roots, discarding the old centre. Split big plants using a spade and fork back to back.

It's a good idea to clear the whole bed every 3 years anyway, to clear perennial weeds and re-jig the planting plan. Dig in some compost and give a dressing of bone meal before re-planting. It is amazing how it rejuvenates things the following year.

Continue to take cuttings

There is still time to take cuttings of hardy shrubs. Take a 1ft piece of a mature healthy shoot of this year's growth (ie stem brown not green). Cut the bottom level just at the bottom of a leaf joint. Cut the top at an angle (so that you can tell the top from the bottom!) Take the leaves off the bottom half and stick it in the ground in a sheltered place open to the rain. Take several – they won't all survive. Then forget about them until the spring.

Jobs to do in October

Plant spring bedding and bulbs Spread your compost and dig, dig, dig!

Jobs to do in November

Tidy up the beds and border for winter. Start winter pruning of roses with a light cut-back to stop rocking in the wind.

Times past ...

In 'Directions for the Gardiner', John Evelyn, 1686:-

'In your Conservatory: Note, that you must never give your Aloes or Sedums one drop of water during the whole winter: And indeed, you can hardly be too sparing of water to your **hous'd plants**; the not observing of this, destroys more plants than all the rudeness of the **Season**: To know when they want refreshing consider the leaves; if they **shrivel** and fold up, give them drink; if **pale** and whitish, they have already too much; and the defect is at the roots, which are in peril of rotting.'

Late Night Surgeries

These will continue to be held on Mondays and Wednesdays and a practice nurse is also in attendance at one evening practice.

Saturday morning surgeries will continue to take place once a month. These are telephone consultations, not face to face at present. The dates for this year are: 2nd October, 6th November, 4th December.

Access changes

During the Covid crisis patients have only been able to enter the premises when called in because of the limited space in our surgery. Shortly it is proposed to leave the outer door unlocked and patients will be able to use the new smaller waiting room. If patients prefer, they can remain in their cars until called.

Prescriptions will continue to be dealt with through the front window. This will prevent the congestion in the corridor which occurred under the old system. To prevent problems in inclement weather an awning will be fitted above the windows.

First Contact Physiotherapist

Sarah Little is the First Contact Physiotherapist for the Northamptonshire Rural PCN of which the Crick Surgery is a member. She works at Crick on Monday mornings and all day on a Wednesday. Appointments can be made by phoning Reception. The areas which Sarah deals with are: all soft tissue injuries, sprains, strains or sports injuries; arthritis in any joint; possible problems with muscles, ligaments, tendons or bone e.g. tennis elbow, carpal tunnel syndrome, ankle sprains, spinal pain including lower back pain and neck pain; spinal -related pain in arms, legs e.g. pins and needles or numbness, post-orthopaedic surgery.

She is unable to deal with the following: acutely unwell; children under 16; medical management of rheumatoid conditions; women's health, antenatal and post-natal problems; house-bound patients; neurological and respiratory conditions; headaches; acute mental health crisis or patients who do not want to see a first contact practitioner


