Hello everyone, I do hope you had a good summer and holidays. The weather was a bit inclement at times but I'm sure we all enjoyed the sunshine (when we had some). Dark nights approaching and the trees all going to sleep for a few months brings our attention to autumn and soon to be winter. Never mind, we have Christmas to look forward to.

More to the point, what has your Parish Council been doing over the past two months and what are we looking to do. I have listed below some of the things completed around our village and a couple of items where we are seeking either your suggestions or some practical help. Please give some thought to them and get in touch by email,

Highways

- Butts Lane has been completed and the Parish Council hope all who use the new path find it much better and that it has not changed the environment too much.
- Councillor Ian Weston and I had a meeting with West Northamptonshire Council Highways to discuss potholes around the village. As I am sure you will have seen, Highways have already commenced some of the work and we are hopeful that this will continue. If you notice any major areas needing to be repaired, please report these to Street Doctor.
- Councillor Weston organised a Community Speed Watch again this year in an effort to reduce the speed of drivers travelling through the village. Thank you to everyone who helped, although a few more volunteers would have been welcome. Thank you, too, to lan Weston for all the hard work he has put into it. (Eds. See report on page 16.)
- I am sure everyone would agree that Speedwatch needs to continue, but lan is having to step down and we will need a new Speed Watch Co-ordinator for next year. If you would be prepared to take this on, please let lan Weston, our Clerk Emma, or me know. lan is happy to give some help.
- The Council was asked by Kilsby School if we could install a new light outside the school gates as the area was very dark during the autumn and winter months when children were leaving school. I am pleased to report that this has been installed and hope the school finds it of some help.

Climate Change

Cllr lan Massey (who leads the council on climate change) organised a great event held in the village hall on 9th September. We are all grateful to lan for the effort and hard work he put into organising the day. (Eds. See report on page 6.) We should also thank Andrew Simpson and Voltalia, all those organisations which made presentations, and the W.I for organizing the refreshments. Ian will be organising a follow up event and will publicise details of this later.

Kilsby Village Website Website

 The Council wants to update the Village Website to improve its appearance and ease of access. Village organisations interested in having space should contact Cllr Oliver Houlton (email details on page 2).

Community Green Space/Outside Sport Facilities/Village Projects

- As reported previously, the PC is trying to find a plot of land, somewhere either in the village or nearby, to purchase on behalf of the village for the benefit of all residents. In order to achieve this, we have applied for a grant from the S106 funds (funds given by the developers of Cildes Croft to the village). If you have any land you would be prepared to sell for this purpose or know of any which might be available, please get in touch with our Clerk, Emma.
- The PC wants to commemorate the coronation of King Charles, Hopefully, I will be able to let you all know how we are going to do this in the next edition of the KK.
- We are also considering an event to mark the 80th anniversary of D-Day on 6th June 2024. If anyone has any ideas about this or would like to get involved with the planning, please do let me know.
- Cllr Weston has a lot of crocus, daffodil and other bulbs to plant around the village and is looking for people who could help with this task so that the village will look really lovely next spring.

Phone Box Books

As I have mentioned previously, we have been trying to relocate the book exchange which was previously housed in the phone box. It is pleasing to report that St Faith's is considering having it in the church. Please keep a look out for further information about this on social media and the village website.

I was very pleased to attend the Kilsby Climate Action event in September at the village hall. I look forward to supporting the team being set up to follow up and monitor the ideas and actions to reduce carbon emissions that were suggested at the event.

There are many carbon reduction initiatives and projects included in West Northants first Sustainability Report which are contributing to the Council's sustainability commitments and its net zero pledges.

One of these projects is to assess the feasibility of installing large scale solar farms on its own land in order to supply the Council's energy demands from renewable energy. The Council is also working on a scheme to enable a village that is off-grid to utilise renewable energy instead of oil or solid fuels. The proposal is to hold a competition to select a village and if the scheme is successful more villages might follow, which would reduce both the carbon footprint of off-grid villages and heating costs.

Councillors understood until very recently that the new draft Local Plan would be ready for public consultation in October. The date has now been deferred to February 2024 owing to delays in the detailed technical work on the number of dwellings estimated to be needed and the amount of employment land to be provided up to 2041. Kilsby residents will not therefore learn for another 5 months whether the site between the village and DIRFT will be included in the draft Local Plan. I, along with the other ward councillors will be continuing to support Kilsby Action Group in its campaign to retain this land as an important green buffer between the village's rural setting and its neighbouring industrial landscape.

The Council has started work on a new Local Transport Plan which will complement the Local Plan and should go out for consultation next year. This will set out a strategy for the management, maintenance and development of a local transport network. It should align with the Council's net zero commitments with priorities enabling people to be better connected, making places healthier and safer and levelling up left behind areas. The consultation will be an important opportunity for local residents to contribute their views on their preferred travel options during a period when people may be travelling less overall due to continued expansion of home/hybrid working.



Village Meeting on The Climate Emergency

(From the Organising Group, Ian Massey, Andrew Simpson and Rupert Knowles)

How fitting that the meeting took place on the UK's hottest day of the year. Although not as dramatic a temperature as in the summer of 2022, it does serve as a reminder that the UK is not immune from the kind of extreme heatwaves and flooding that has taken place across the world.

It was disappointing that so few residents came to the meeting and therefore missed an opportunity to hear about actions they may be able to take to reduce greenhouse gas emissions here in Kilsby and contribute to establishing a plan for the village. A number of residents had registered their interest in the event although they would be on holiday and wished to be kept informed going forward. However, there were sufficient numbers present to make the event worthwhile.

Following an introductory presentation which set the background to the climate emergency and some of the impacts, guest speakers made presentations aimed at stimulating residents thinking about what steps they can take to reduce their carbon footprint.

Speakers from Voltalia, a global provider of solar farms, outlined their approach to mitigating the environmental impact of such schemes. The main obstacle facing developers of solar and other generators of green electricity is the lack of preparedness of the national grid. Voltalia operate a Community Benefits Scheme which is of particular interest to Kilsby. Under this scheme, village organisations will be able to bid for grants of up to £5000 for suitable projects benefitting a sustainable community when work commences on the Rainsbrook solar farm.

A presentation by Climate Action West Northants (CA-WN); https://exchange.ca-wn.org/ described some actions already taken by CA-WN and some planned for the future. It described the work with home-made air quality monitors placed near schools and other congestion hotspots. These showed the pollution impact of both the school run and lighting fires in the evening. The message is that parents must not sit in their car with the engine running while waiting to pick up pupils from school! CA-WN is also involved in analysing the gargantuan task of making all 163,000 homes in West Northants more climate friendly.

The speaker from M+S Renewables gave a brief outline of the beneficial integration of solar panels with battery storage for use with electric car charging and taking advantage of competitive tariffs from

energy suppliers at different times of the day. The company provides affordable, sustainable energy solutions that can help reduce carbon footprint and save money on energy bills.

Braunston Climate Action Network explained how they are organised and how they have established a plan for the Parish. The Network is independent of any Council or Group but influences the Parish Council. A particular initiative implemented by the Braunston and which might be of interest to Kilsby is the classification of grass mowing into amenity grass, mown every three weeks, and wildlife-rich grassland, only mown twice a year.

West Northants Council Sustainability Department gave the final presentation on the work they are doing to take community leadership for sustainability in the county. Their goal is to move towards net zero carbon emissions by 2030. 5% of emissions in the county are generated by Council operations which and it has influence over a further 30%, with the remainder from residents and businesses

Questions to the presenters led to the involvement of residents in a session generating ideas as to what they can do to reduce emissions. A number of residents have volunteered to move the agenda forward and a brief follow up meeting is being arranged with them to plan the way ahead based on the responses obtained.

Thanks are due to Voltalia who provided the publicity material for the event as well as the equipment used for the presentations. Thanks are also due to the Kilsby branch of the Women's Institute who provided refreshments for the event, and to the Village Shop for a display on their recycle/reuse initiative.

It is not too late to be involved in contributing to the village plan which you can do by emailing kilsbyclimateaction@btinternet.com or by filling in a personal pledge card on activity you can take to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. These are available in the village shop and can be left there for collection.

Kilsby Action Group (KAG) previously advised supporters that the Draft Local Plan, which will determine the sites permitted to be used for development, was due In October 2023. We have campaigned aggressively to get the Kilsby site removed from the Local Plan and have been supported by our MP and all of our District Councillors, Council for the Protection of Rural England and Kilsby Parish Council. We can now report that the Draft Local Plan has been delayed and will be published in March 2024. We have another meeting with West Northamptonshire Council in November 2023 and will continue to campaign until the Draft Local Plan is published.

Barby Road Proposed Development

It was September 2021 when Richborough distributed a consultation document around Kilsby in connection with their proposal to build houses in green fields off Barby Road – **2 YEARS AGO**. KAG submitted an objection within the deadline in December 2021 and nothing has happened since !!!

We have continually chased the planning department and have been supported by all of our Councillors. We have not been able to get a planning committee hearing date to present our case. We have heard anecdotally that the planning officer has been advised by the developer that they will be bringing forward a reduced proposal, but nothing has been has asked for a review of the case.

Helen Frost spoke to us in August about the faith of those serving at the front in WWI. Often for the men (and women) at the front in the Great War there was little to give them hope. For many, who at home might, at best, have been ambivalent about religion, having something to look to and give them hope and confidence was a support they would have fallen without. Ministers, although non-combatants, often committed acts of great bravery and many died serving at the front. When the war ended ministers had received 3 Victoria Crosses, 67 Distinguished Service Orders and 487 Military Crosses. There were many nationalities and many faiths in the ranks. Since ministers were limited in numbers, they all studied the rites and rituals of other faiths in order that any of them could conduct these services for any of the fallen. Helen gave us a fascinating insight into this awful time. 'I never forgot the other life the Great War took away...'

On a lighter note, in September we had a talk and demonstration from artist Michael Peachey. Michael is a self-taught painter who sold his first painting at the age of 11 for £2! After that he was hooked... to start his demo he blocked out outline, rough from copying photo he'd taken the day before. Then he started to fill in the image



with colour and asked volunteers to fill in different areas! Amazingly the picture came out ok! He encourages anyone to have a go at painting for enjoyment and spends lots of time helping people with problems such as head injuries to enjoy the thrill of producing a piece of art!

Our meetings are at 19:30 on the second Thursday of each month in the village hall - visitors are welcome - it's just £5. At our October meeting we'll hear from Adrian Perkins, a Ghost Detective! Then in November we'll hear from local travel consultant Grant Bowles.



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



We've continued to have visiting hedgehogs over the summer - we seem to get the same one for several nights in a row and then that one moves on, and we get a different one (or two!). Several people have reported seeing them passing through their gardens which is amazing - it would be so good though if there was a way of mapping those visits. Maybe next year? Any suggestions welcome! There is a national hedgehog survey due next year - I can't remember the full details but there are to be several urban sites fitted with cameras over a given period and then the analysis is due to be done by Al! I'll look forward to the results.

During the hot spells of August, butterfly visitors to the garden were amazing and in great numbers. The most numerous were Red Admirals and also plenty of large and small whites – in flight I find it so hard to tell the difference as it is markings as well as size you must check. According to the Butterfly Conservation charity, there were 95,000 participants in the Big Butterfly Count this year which is great – the Red Admiral had a huge increase since last year and is now a UK resident.

We also had a few visits from a Hummingbird Hawk Moth on buddleia flowers— a truly amazing little thing whose wings beat faster than you can see. I was also amazed one morning to find an enormous moth in my light box— a Blue Underwing— a rare migrant moth. If one flew into your house, you would certainly know about it but please catch it gently and let it out!

Quantities of birds in the garden have been variable but some days we have seen families of sparrows, starlings and blue tits raiding the feeders before disappearing just as fast into the fields (or someone else's garden!). I look forward to seeing some different species in the winter – you can usually see some interesting winter water birds at Draycote Water – there have to be some positives about the cold weather!

By then, the house martin I saw this morning (20th September) will have travelled to Africa. One of the bird charities is planning to use tiny geolocators to find out more about their route and where in Africa our visiting birds end up.

COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH

We have now completed Kilsby Community Speed Watch for this year. Thanks to the volunteers. We couldn't have done this without your help.

Unfortunately, at the beginning of our four weeks the weather was not kind to us and we had to cancel a few sessions. However, we were able to complete 13 sessions in total - 12 on the A361 and one on Main Road. We recorded eight vehicles on Main Road and 378 on the A361, all travelling at 35mph or considerably over in some cases.

Sadly, one village resident was caught for the third time since we restarted Speed Watch after the pandemic, and three of the speeding vehicles coming down the A361 turned into the Cildes Croft estate. Clearly the safety of other road users in Kilsby does not apply to them!

Because of additional future commitments I am reluctantly standing down as Speed Watch Co-ordinator for Kilsby, but am happy to help at any sessions which are organised for next year. Hopefully, someone will volunteer to take over the role, otherwise Kilsby will be unable to join the Community Speed Watch campaign.

GARDENERS' CORNER

An Indian summer?...

..at least it was for a week of 30 degrees in September! We have had a bad year for apples and runner beans, but the autumn raspberries are great. Looking longer term, we have now stopped trying to grow delphiniums and lupins as they just don't like repeated hot dry spells.

Take cuttings

Autumn is a good time to take cuttings of hardy shrubs. Take a 6 inch to 1 ft piece of a mature healthy shoot of this year's growth. Cut the bottom level just at the bottom of a leaf joint. Cut the top at an angle (so that you can tell the top from the bottom!) Take the leaves off the bottom half and stick it in the ground in a sheltered place open to the rain. Take several – they won't all survive. Then forget about them until the spring.

Divide your herbaceous perennials

October is a good time to divide your herbaceous perennials. Cut the plant back first. Then dig it up, divide off strong looking pieces with roots, discarding the old centre. Split big plants using a spade or two forks back to back.

Plant bulbs

When planting up your bulb pots put some sharp sand under the bulbs to improve drainage. Given the pattern of occasional heavy rain, it is also a good idea to protect the pots with a slate over the winter.

Jobs to do in October

Sow sweet peas in pots for next years garden show! Plant spring bedding and bulbs

Jobs to do in November

Tidy up the beds and border for winter. Start winter pruning of roses with a light cut-back to stop rocking in the wind.

Times past...

In 'Directions for the Gardiner', John Evelyn, 1686:-

"You can hardly be too sparing of water to your hous'd plants; the not observing of this, destroys more plants than all the rudeness of the **Season**: To know when they want refreshing consider the leaves; if they **shrivel** and fold up, give them drink; if **pale** and whitish, they have already too much; and the defect is at the roots, which are in peril of rotting."

Flu Vaccinations

These are being carried out earlier this year and have already started in September and will carry on through October.

The Surgery are very pleased with the response this year, and this is very important as they have to order vaccinations and pay for them earlier in the year based on the numbers the surgery usually vaccinate. If some patients get their vaccinations elsewhere the Surgery are left with spare vaccines which cannot be used and they are not reimbursed for them. If you are in a qualifying group and normally have your vaccination at the surgery and you have not booked your vaccination yet please contact the surgery and make an appointment.

Covid Vaccinations

These will be carried out by the Surgery this year and will be taking place very shortly. The Surgery will contact you when they would like you to make a booking, and this will probably have happened by the time this article is published. This is therefore a reminder to book your appointment if you have not already done so.

Repeat Prescriptions

As I mentioned in my last article, please give five WORKING days' notice when ordering your repeat prescription. Many of you will have noticed that you are often notified your prescription is ready much sooner than the five days. The dispensary works hard to get out prescriptions as soon as possible, but demand varies and sometimes it takes longer than at other times. To make sure you get your medications when you need them, please continue to give five days' notice.

Telephone system

Those of you have contacted the surgery recently will have noticed that they have installed a new telephone system. This will have great benefits for patients and the staff. The most obvious one is that when making appointments, whilst you will be in a queue as usual, you will have the option of requesting a call back with your place in the queue being held until it is your turn, when you will be called.

Training Days

The surgery will be closed for mandatory staff training on Wednesday 18th October, Wednesday 15th November, and Wednesday 13th December from 12.30 pm – 6.30 pm. It will re-open from 6.30 pm - 8.00 pm, for booked appointments only, and from 6.30 pm - 7.30 pm for prescription collection

We have been back in school for two weeks now, after a relaxing summer break.

The week school finished for the summer, we had an Ofsted inspection on Tuesday 18th and Wednesday 19th July which was a bit of a surprise! We are very pleased to have been given a 'Good' rating and with the feedback. The report should soon be available online for everyone to view.

We have only been back in school for two weeks so there is not a lot to report at this stage, but we are now really fortunate to have a classroom for each year group in school which is certainly better for everyone concerned.

At the beginning of September, we welcomed 23 new Reception children, they have settled in really well already.

For their first week they came in only for the morning or the afternoon, but then they all came in full time the following week. They spent the first week getting to know their teacher Miss Allen, and one another, as well as finding out



about school rules and routines. They have been learning sounds s, a, t and p, in their phonics. In their Learning Through Play, they have enjoyed lots of play including building dens, creating models, playing families, making hot chocolate in the mud kitchen and riding on the bikes/scooters! In Maths they played games to practise their number recognition and 1:1 counting skills.



During the first week back, the Year 2 children in Cedar class have begun talking about their topic for this term which is based on media and broadcasting,



with a focus on the history of early communication and leading to the invention of radio and television.


