Well, it's November again with Christmas and a new year around the corner and what has your Parish Council been up to on your behalf? Well, on 11th November, I and others from the PC accompanied the staff and children from Kilsby School to the War Memorial where we laid a wreath on behalf of the Parish and the children laid wreaths that they had made at school. Reverend Kit held a small service. Thank you, children, and a big thank you to Rev Kit as well. **(See pictures on page 14.)**

This will be the last PC article for this year, and I hope you have enjoyed reading what we have been doing over the past twelve months. We thank you for your support. The next meeting of the council is at the village hall on the 10th January 2023 at 7.30 pm, so please come along then if you wish to say or suggest something.

Speed Signs (VAS)

As you will have noticed, the Council felt it necessary to improve the speed signs (VAS) on the A361 and install a new VAS on Main Road by the zebra crossing. Although this has been successful in reducing the number of speeding motorists, we are fully aware of the need to do more. Both Councillor Weston and I have had several meetings with the Highways Liaison Officer from West Northants Council (WNC) and we are extremely hopeful that a speed reduction from 50 mph to 40 mph will be put into place on the approach to the village from Daventry (A361) with 'alligator teeth' being painted on the road to warn drivers they are entering a 30 mph speed limit.

Speed Watch

Councillor Weston will be organising Speed Watch again during the coming year and really could do with more Kilsby residents to help. Can you give two hours of your time or even a couple of two-hour slots during the months of March and most likely September next year. It's not hard work and if you can't stand for long periods perhaps you could sit down and jot the registration numbers down and record the speeds. It really is worthwhile: 66 drivers were reported this year and more could have been if Councillor Weston had had more volunteers.

Budget for 2023-24

We have been compiling the PC's budget and precept for the forthcoming year 2023-24 and it has been decided that because everyone is facing higher energy and food bills, the Council will not increase the precept this time. The situation will be reviewed during 2024-25. I hope you will all be pleased with this decision and that it goes some way to make up for the increase imposed this year.

Recreation Ground

The Recreation Park Committee are looking at the possibility of putting in more equipment for the younger members of our parish to use. Trees Planted

You will have probably noticed that the PC has planted several trees supplied to us via the Japanese Embassy, and also two special trees to mark The Queens Platinum Jubilee and, sadly, her passing. We will be placing plaques by these, and you can see them on Devon Ox Green. We must again thank Cllr Weston for the work on this project.

School Parking

The council has received several complaints regarding inconsiderate parking whilst children are being dropped off at or collected from school. We do realise that time is important but must ask that parents be considerate to residents and that they try to park in the manner they would expect near their own homes. The new tenant of the George, Hari, has given permission for parents to use their car park during school drop off and collection times. Could everyone please use this facility, even though it means a slightly longer walk, rather than causing a problem by parking outside the school. We are grateful to Hari for his kind offer.

S106 Funds

Councillor Bridges, our clerk, Emma and I had an extremely useful meeting with WNC regarding the use of these valuable resources for the benefit of our village. Several ideas for using the funds were put forward. The Council is currently looking into the viability of a community orchard, or there may be the opportunity to provide further sports facilities. I will keep you informed as things progress.

Further government funding has been made available to help with the cost of living for eligible families. The distribution of this third tranche of the Household Support Fund is directed primarily to funding the lower income sector of the working community, and families with children. This is closely aligned to the areas of deprivation within the region, thus ensuring that the communities living in areas of highest poverty are prioritised. The distribution of these funds will meet the wider communities' financial needs, where other grants and funding are not available. For more information see the article below.

The Shared Lives Service, which sees carers across Northamptonshire share their lives and homes to support others, has been rated 'outstanding' in a report by the Care Quality Commission. The report summarised that people were 'supported to achieve their aspirations and goals', were 'enabled to access specialist health and social care support when needed' and were 'supported to play an active role in maintaining and improving their health and wellbeing'. We are incredibly proud that the Shared Lives Service has received this outstanding rating, which is testament to the amazing dedication and commitment of everyone involved.

Our Disabled People's Forum is working with leisure centres across West Northants, as well as Northamptonshire Sport, to find out more about what people with disabilities want from their local leisure centres. There will be a drop-in session at Daventry Leisure Centre on December 3rd from 1.00 pm - 4.00 pm where you can find out more and fill in the survey. It can also be accessed online at tinyurl.com/382bevec

The Council continues to take a very strict position against fly-tipping of rubbish. There have been a number of fines levied on offenders and help for landowners to clear dumped rubbish is to be extended.

As part of its plans to control its finances the Council will close the current offices in Daventry and relocate the essential local services elsewhere in the town. Current use of the building in Lodge Road is suboptimal and represents an inappropriate use of available resources.

On a happier note, the Council has been awarded the prestigious 'Best in the East Midlands Region' award for its support for the local small business community.

NEW COST OF LIVING SUPPORT HUB

West Northants Council (WNC) has launched a new online support hub and phone-line to help residents find help during the ongoing cost of living crisis. The webpage is designed to be easy to navigate and contains lots of information on accessing grants, money and debt advice, government funding, wellbeing tips and links to local community organisations. The drop-down options are tailored to specific users and aim to make the information quick to find and easily accessible, without the need to scroll for a long period of time. Residents can also find tips to help keep daily costs down, and a directory of Warm Welcoming Spaces – community buildings offering people in need a comforting place to keep warm and enjoy a little company.



For those who prefer to talk to someone on the phone, WNC customer services team is available between the hours of 9.00 am and 5.00 pm, Monday to Friday to offer support and advice.

WNC understand it can be difficult for people to find out what support is available, so they have worked closely with partners to create a central hub of information to help with this.

West Northants Council has responded to the cost of living crisis by setting up an online support hub and phoneline to help residents. The webpage is designed to be user friendly and contains lots of information on accessing grants, money and debt advice, government funding, links to local community organisations and warm community spaces. (Eds. See article and contact details on page 4.)

At present the Council has a total of 93 councillors. The Local Boundary Commission for England has decided that this number should be reduced to 77 and the first of two consultations on a boundary review recently closed. There will be further consultation February-April next year on the proposed new pattern of wards. The Council has submitted a new draft pattern with some significant changes for villages in the current Braunston and Crick ward. Kilsby would remain part of a ward with just the villages of Crick, Barby and Onley. The proposal is to make it a single member ward only.

The reason for grouping these villages is that they share facilities and the impact of DIRFT is a common issue for them all, which seems to ignore the fact the Lilbourne and Yelvertoft are also very close to DIRFT and also share services. Residents will be able to have their say at the second consultation next year, about these proposals including being represented by only one councillor

Recently I met a group of young people representing the Northampton Youth Forum at an event for UK Parliament week. I had my first experience of a political "speed date" where groups visited councillors at a table to ask questions and then would circulate to another table. Many of the excellent questions asked were about environmental issues and how schools could be made greener. Secondary schools in West Northants could look at the example of the all year group eco-committee of Guilsborough School, which earlier this year was awarded an Eco-Schools Green Flag. Youth Forums are planned for Daventry and Towcester areas also. When I have more information I will let Kilsby Youth Club know.

Another recent first was the discovery of a very special museum in Northampton which houses a collection of 11,000 rare and historic leather items, from prehistory to the present day. The Museum of Leathercraft is currently in a very unsuitable location in the Grosvenor shopping centre and is only open to groups by appointment. The Council is making progress on plans to transfer the collection to the Shoe Museum which will mean that everyone can enjoy and celebrate this wonderful addition to Northampton's proud shoe and leather heritage.

A TRIBUTE TO MARGARET DEAN

(From the Editors)

We are sure that most the residents of Kilsby will have heard that Margaret died on Tuesday 27th September 2022 aged 93 years.



As a very active member of St. Faith's Social Committee,

Margaret unselfishly devoted a great deal of her time to organising fund raising events for the Church such as coffee mornings and quizzes and of course the inevitable raffles. You could never get past Margaret when she was selling tickets!

Margaret was also the captain and a stalwart of the bell-ringing team at St. Faith's and had an ambition to keep ringing until she reached 90 years of age. She achieved that, and continued to ring right up to the time of her death.

In the February – March 2019 edition of the Kilsby Kronickle we published a brief synopsis of Margaret's life to mark her 90th birthday. The information in the synopsis was kindly given to us by her family and we thought our readers would be interested to see it again:

- 1928 Born and lived in Suffolk
- 1946 Left home and joined the Army at the age of eighteen
- 1948 Married an airman and had three children over the course of eleven years
- 1973-1974 Became Mayoress to her husband the Mayor of the London Borough of Greenwich.
- 1974 Took part in a charity cycle ride in her bikini. The local media report of this led to a large donation from none other than Sir Billy Butlin.
 - Served as Governor of several schools and was a JP.
- 1980-1981 Became Mayor of the London Borough of Greenwich
- 1981 As Mayor, gave the order to the Royal Artillery Gun Captain to fire the cannon that started the **first** London Marathon on Blackheath.
- 1983 Moved to Kilsby to be closer to her boat moored at Braunston and enjoyed many happy days exploring the waterways of England.

Not only a very active member of St Faith's Social Committee also a Bell Ringer, gardener, stitcher, short mat bowler..... Margaret participated enthusiastically in the social events in Arnills Way, where she lived, including being on the winning teams for the two outdoor, socially distanced, quizzes organised during lockdown! Covid wasn't going to keep her indoors!

She was a regular contributor to the Kronickle and the October – November 2022 edition was no exception. Her usual entry from the St. Faiths Social Committee reported on events held and some planned for the future. This time there was also an appeal for new members on behalf of Kilsby Bowls Club in which she was also very active.

Margaret was a lovely lady and will be sadly missed.

Jenny, Martin, Simon and all the family would like to thank everyone who has offered their condolences and messages of support over the last few weeks and to those who have helped us out (especially Moira and Elaine). It is wonderful to know that Mum was held in such high esteem and respect within the village.

You may like to know that Mum's donation page on the Cancer Research UK website (<u>https://</u><u>fundraise.cancerresearchuk.org/page/in-memory-of</u> <u>-margaret-dean</u>) has so far raised £845, including £269 from the collection at her funeral.



NATURE NOTES - JULY 2022

It's mid-November and with such mild weather, we've still been getting a hedgehog visitor most nights – sometimes early and sometimes late. We assume the temperature hasn't forced the hog into hibernation so it is taking every opportunity to have an extra snack to build up its resources ready for the long winter ahead. They really need to weigh 600g before the winter, so any little beetle or bit of cat food helps. Don't forget if you see a hog out in the daytime, it is probably struggling in some way. You can always contact Animal House on Rugby 575300. Look at Hedgehogstreet.org – Hugh Warwick is a great campaigner for wildlife.

Feathered visitors to our garden were quite low in numbers back in October. I think this was because there was plenty of food around in the hedges and trees away from gardens. Numbers have picked up and we now see plenty of goldfinches, blue and great tits at the feeders plus of course the usual band of jackdaws and the more docile pigeons. People ask about avian flu and its effect on garden birds – from what I've read, it has affected British seabirds far worse.

If we have old or damaged apples, I core them and thread them on a cane stuck into the ground and you can create a sort of feeding tube! It was odd in the early autumn that they weren't being eaten but thankfully blackbird numbers are up, even though they have been affected by another virus (Usutu). Hopefully we will still get an influx of fieldfares and redwings which are in the same family, and they do sometimes visit gardens looking for berries or fruit.

Some nature facts I've found about moulting are that sparrowhawks (and other birds of prey), only moult one flight feather each side of the wing at a time so they can still fly fast enough to catch their prey – nature is very clever don't you think! Also, the reason that our small garden birds hide away in the hedgerows in late August/September is that they moult all their flights feathers at once, making them extremely vulnerable.

It's also interesting to realise how important insects are to our world, despite the fact we tend to think of them with annoyance, either biting us, invading our houses, or eating our food. They perform vital functions such as replenishing our soil and removing waste and are a lifeblood of our plants. So, spare a thought for a tiny midge which crawls into the flower of the cacao plant to pollinate it, thus allowing us to consume lots of chocolate, particularly over Christmas!

GARDENERS' CORNER

Is November the new October?

What a swing from dry to wet in the last month. In the end Kilsby had average rain in October – but all in the last two days of the month! We are now three weeks into November and have already had the full quota of rain for the month and no sign of frost. My usual rule was to start winter tidying up of the garden on 5th November but this year it will be 5th December!

Don't rush into winter pruning

There is plenty of time to prune fruit trees and bushes in February. It is worth checking your fruit tree stakes and ties, particularly those on dwarfing rootstocks which will have weaker roots. It is worth shortening the long shoots on bush and standard roses enough to stop them rocking in the autumn winds. But don't hard prune yet as that risks new growth starting too soon in the spring.

Lifting Dahlias

We normally lift our dahlias now, dry them off and then plant them in the dry greenhouse beds. If you want to bet on a mild winter, then you can leave your dahlias in the ground, protected with a mulch of compost.

Jobs to do in December

- Plant that garlic you should have planted in November!
- Sit in the warm reading your gardening catalogues.
- Finish your planting plan for next year.
- Order any remaining seeds and plants.

Jobs to do in January

- Clean, wash and fumigate your greenhouse.
- Fork over round your bulbs and top dress with bonemeal.
- Expose pots of bulbs to frost but protect from rain.
- Later in the month, sow tomatoes in warmth for early crops.

In 'Directions for the Gardiner', John Evelyn, 1686:-"Look to your **fountain-pipes**, and cover them with fresh and warm **litter** out of the Stable, a good thickness, lest the frosts crack them; remember it in time, and the **Advice** will save you both trouble and charge.'

That advice is just as relevant today for your outside taps and pipes, although the material for lagging has changed a bit!

Her bequest was that her estate was divided into 5 and given to – RNLI, Kilsby Village Hall, Crick Surgery, Friends of Danetre Hospital and Friends of St. Cross Hospital. Crick Surgery has used some of their share for an awning and air conditioning. The RNLI. has put her name on the new lifeboat at Gt.Yarmouth & Gorlestone which Margaret was very excited about. Sadly Margaret didn't see the pictures of the boat I had got hold of (see below). Margaret was such a generous and lovely lady and arranged for a seat in Pam's memory to be put at Ashby Road/The Banks junction by the footpath.



In October we held our AGM but also had a fascinating talk from Heather Wilson from Green Acres Farm near Staverton. Heather was a farmer's wife, happily working on the farm and bringing up her children who attended the local village school. Then the children went to upper school in Daventry; and Heather came to realise what different and difficult lives some children had. From this realisation sprang the Green Acres Farm community initiative. A cross between a business and a charity, its main purpose is to help give life chances to youngsters with issues. The work she and her team do is inspiring and humbling.

Our Group meeting was addressed by Chris Knight who told the story of his Auntie who had lived in the same house since 1948, and never threw anything away. The family knew clearing the house would be a mammoth task but even they were astonished by what they found: over 4,000 paper bags, Christmas wrapping paper carefully flattened and stored, newspapers going back to the 1950s. There were empty dog biscuit bags, though the last dog had died in 1975. Fifty three new packs of playing cards; although the pack the family used to play with each Christmas was held together with tape. A collection of used bandages; all carefully washed and labelled with who had used them and why! They found seventeen tins of pink salmon in a cupboard and, since she had always served red salmon for Sunday tea, the family wondered why. Clearly very thrifty, Auntie eventually confessed that the luxurious tinned red salmon she'd served for Sunday tea each week was actually pink salmon with cochineal colouring! As she pointed out, no one had ever noticed. A reminder to us all of our own guirky sometimes infuriating, relatives, sometimes hilarious!

Our meetings are at 7.30 pm on the second Thursday of each month in the village hall - visitors are welcome - it's just £5. Our next meeting will be in January when we'll hear from Helen Frost about the Women's Land Army.

We have had a very busy start to the year. Already we are approaching the Christmas period, time flies! The KS1 & KS2 children really enjoyed their Film Nights in October. The KS2 children watched the Paddington 2 film, and the KS1 children saw 'Room on the Broom' and 'Zog'. Drinks and snacks were included. Many thanks to the KSA for organising this very popular event.

Our Harvest Assembly this year took place on Wednesday 19th October in school. The children brought their harvest gifts in to distribute to the elderly people at Kilsby House and also around the village. We have received a lot of thank you letters: people were happy to receive the gift boxes. This is the first time for 2 years we have been able to deliver gifts. We may have missed some people out as our list has not been updated during this time. If you know of someone who is over 80, lives in Kilsby and hasn't received a harvest gift this year, please email mrs.burton@kilsbyprimary.net and let me know their details so we can ensure that they will not miss out next year.



It was a lovely harvest assembly. Cedar class talked about what they were thankful for. Some were thankful for the crops, some were thankful

for the farmers working hard and some were thankful for the people who work in the shops where we buy our food. The Reception children shared what they had learnt about Harvest and wore the Harvest crowns that they had spent a lot of time making.

This term the Year 4 and Year 5 children in Hawthorn class enjoyed science with Mr Botterill. They created circuits using a wire, a light bulb and a cell. They



had great fun working out ways to light up the bulb. They have also been working hard on their Maths, looking into properties of 2D shapes and perimeters, so what better than measuring real objects! They worked in pairs identifying properties and perimeters of 2D shapes around the school. On Thursday 13th October our football team played against 5 other local teams at a tournament in Daventry. It was a tough competition, but out of six matches played:



we won two and lost four, scoring sixteen goals and conceding eleven.



On Wednesday 19th October our rugby team took part in a Tag Rugby Tournament at Daventry Rugby Club. Kilsby finished fourth out of seventeen teams competing.

We were very proud of both the football and the rugby teams who throughout both tournaments displayed excellent team spirit and sportsmanship.

The Year 3 children in Hazel class came into school one day in October, dressed as wild animals! They had been reading the book, 'Where the Wild Things Are' and so in connection with this, we decided to dress up as wild animals for the day. The children looked fantastic in their outfits! Also, they have been stewing fruit and tasting it! They've been learning about Stone Age settlements and the ancient Skara Brae settlement on the Orkney Islands.

The Reception children in Chestnut class have been practising how to write their name and the letter formation of the sounds taught in Phonics. In Maths they have been learning how to represent numbers 0-5, what the rules of counting are and one more/ less than numbers to 5. Also learning how to add numbers within 10 together.

They have been learning all about Christianity (the importance of God, Jesus, the Bible, a cross and a candle) and also all about the 'Creation Story'. They have looked at Diwali, making Rangoli patterns and Diya lamps.

In PE the children enjoyed practising their throwing and catching skills and also played games with Miss Walton.

The Year 1 children in Cherry class have been looking at one more and one less in Maths, in English we have read 'Lost and Found' looking at the features of a book including the author and the title. (Cont. On next page) They looked at verbs and past tense. The children worked really hard on this. They have enjoyed experimenting with glitter on their hands as germs, to see how it can spread and the best way to wash it off. They also created a rain cloud and watched rain drip through, they used sparkling water to create dancing raisins and then created a rainbow using skittles. The children had great fun having a go at the experiments, observing what happened and making predictions.

The Year 2 children in Cedar class have been looking at properties of 2D and 3D shapes. During English they have been writing a story about Tom and his Grandma (based on the book 'The Building Boy') adding exciting features such as alliteration. Miss Walton is teaching Boccia this term for PE and the children have really enjoyed this. They have started their new topic based around Geography, Paddington's Passport.

Late September the Year 6 children in Maple class enjoyed a cookery lesson making pizza! They enjoyed putting all their favourite toppings on top and of course the best bit was eating them! They have also been having a go at creating their own computer games, and having fun trying each other's games out. On World Science day in November, they created 'Fruit Volcanoes' using lemons, limes and oranges with food colouring, washing up liquid and bicarbonate of soda. The children were fascinated with the results!

Waste and recycling collection crews will be working throughout the festive season to make sure services are delivered on time and with no delays.

Downloadable Christmas and New Year bin calendars will be available from the Council's website at <u>www.westnorthants.gov.uk/bins-recycling-and-waste</u> by the end of November.

But in the meantime, the key information for Kilsby residents is:

• Waste and recycling collection days in the South Northamptonshire and Northampton areas will not change over Christmas and New Year.

• Collections in the Daventry area which were due to take place on Monday 26 December, will take place on Saturday 24 December instead.

All the children and staff walked to St Faith's churchyard to join Rev Kit beside the War Memorial on Friday 11th November. At 11.00 am we held a 2-minute silence in respect and remembrance of all those who lost their lives during the World Wars.

Real tree collections

Crews will collect real Christmas trees between 9 and 20 January. Residents in the Daventry and South Northants areas should put real Christmas trees out on the day that garden waste is due to be collected in their area. You do not need a garden waste subscription to put out your real Christmas tree. Please ensure any trees over 6ft tall are cut in half, so they will fit into the lorries safely.

Additional recycling

Additional recycling can be put out in clear plastic bags or boxes alongside recycling bins and boxes, or can also be taken to the nearest Household Waste Recycling Centre. KILSBY ACTION GROUP

The proposed Richborough Planning application for the development on Barby Rd is still awaiting a decision by the Planning office of West Northants Council (WNC). This may be due to a lack of resources within the department, resulting in a long delay. We have repeatedly pressed the planning authorities to get this application into committee for a ruling. We are very confident in the strength of our case and want it heard for a final outcome as soon as possible. We believe the developer is simply sitting on their hands and waiting to see if the planning market turns in their favour. Our latest action is to ask our MP Chris Heaton-Harris to intercede on our behalf with WNC and at publication of this edition of Kilsby Kronicle we are still waiting for his response. Please make sure that we have your correct up-to-date email address or mobile number so we can contact you. We can then keep you updated before the next issue .

The land between DIRFT and Kilsby is currently seeing lots of activity with a number of archaeological pits being dug, which is generally a pre-cursor to a full scale application. Readers will recall that this area is one site under consultation as part of the WNC long term development plan. They sent out a 'call for sites' across the whole region and are assessing them and they will then create a shortlist where development will be permitted over the next 15 years. Our understanding was that this process has been extended beyond the original date and is unlikely to be completed before Easter . We have already made representations to WNC and indeed had a site meeting with Council leader at the location. We are somewhat surprised that activity is going on before completion of that consultation. This potential development is a real threat to our village, we have to act together to try to stop the builders occupying and developing the space between us and DIRFT.

There is a very real possibility that we will ask villagers to come together again to discuss our next strategic moves before the Feb/March edition of Kronickle. 
WELCOME PACKS


