

Ward councillor's report (Kilsby) March 2024

Draft Local Plan

A revised draft Local Plan will be considered by the Planning Policy Committee for approval this week and then referred to the Full Council on 21st March. The new Plan identifies a need for 4,000 new homes for the plan period of up to 2041 and 10 hectares of strategic employment land.

As many Kilsby residents will now be aware via information from the Kilsby Action Group, the potential employment site included in the 2021 consultation close to Kilsby has not been brought forward to the draft Local Plan. Land at J15 close to the new Northampton Gateway terminal has been selected. The proposed site close to Kilsby is now designated as a Green Wedge, a recognition that there needs to be a buffer between DIRFT and Kilsby to prevent coalescence. Similarly the potential employment site east of J18 M1 has not been brought forward and two Green Wedges have been identified to maintain the physical separation of Lilbourne and Yelvertoft from DIRFT.

While residents will be relieved to know that these greenfield sites are not to be included and designated Green Wedges will help protect the character of Kilsby and other villages adjacent to DIRFT there is a specific policy (EC9) in the draft Plan supporting strategic B8 warehousing and logistics development at DIRFT and the Northampton Gateway subject to certain requirements focussed on sustainable design. A survey has been sent to all parish councils regarding the new settlement hierarchy for West Northants asking for information on their villages and their aspirations. The responses will influence how parishes will be classified in the new Local Plan. The survey needs to be completed by 2nd April.

Plans to improve Air Quality – have your say

A consultation is open on WNC's proposals to reduce pollution and improve air quality, set out in a draft air quality action plan. All councils have a duty to monitor local air quality and ensure that it meets certain standards and West Northants has seven air quality management areas. The consultation closes on 17th March. Transport is the sector with the largest carbon emissions, accounting for 45% of total emissions in West Northants. WNC was criticised last month by campaigners during the meeting of the Full Council at the Guildhall for delaying publishing an air quality action plan until sent a final warning by Defra in December, despite Northampton being one of the most polluted towns in the UK.

Budget Report

At last month's Full Council meeting the final budget, Housing Revenue Account and the setting of Council Tax were approved for 2024/2025. A 4.99% rise on council tax bills is being imposed which will generate an extra £13.m with 2% of the increase going towards

funding adult social care. Due to escalating demand and inflationary pressures the adult social care budget has been increased by 9.5% and the budget for children's services increased by a huge 22%.

£164m will be invested in the Council's capital programme to improve local infrastructure and assets such as land, buildings and equipment. All of the amendments to the budget by the opposition parties were voted down. Recently there was a media report referring to WNC as one of the 19 local authorities that were to be allowed to sell assets to pay for services in the coming financial year to cover their day to day spending. The government announced that these 19 authorities had requested exceptional financial support (EFS): [Exceptional financial support for local authorities for 2024-25 - GOV.UK \(www.gov.uk\)](#) While some local authorities are using EFS because they are in financial distress the WNC finance officer has given assurance that the £6.6m agreed funds relate to a capital sum unused since April 2021 which could only be authorised to be used via the EFS mechanism – it is not a reflection of WNC's financial viability or a sign that it could go bankrupt. The funds will be used to deliver new and preventative projects for the benefit of the Children's Service such as early help hubs and work to reduce placement costs of children in care.
